Leaving Fort Nelson, after spending the night in the parking lot area of the local baseball field, we aimed for the town of Watson Lake, BC. Here grows the sign forest. Some 53,000 signs! It has been here for years and has become a chore for the city to keep replacing rotting posts in the ground. It is apparent that many people steal local signage from their home areas and nail them up here in the sign forest!



We took in a very interesting show at a planetarium type theatre. They portrayed the size of our galaxy within a system that stretches to infinity. The second half of the show was a concise and spectacular show of the Aurora Borealis. There were many video and movie sessions showing the different colors and the undulations of the display at night.

Instead of staying here as planned, we drove another 100 miles to a place we remembered previously. It is called Mukluk Annies. Here they serve a huge dinner of salmon or ribs, or both. When you are done, they have free parking, a free dump station, a free RV and car wash area, free, water fills and the parking includes some sites adjacent to a huge lake. You can also get an all you can eat breakfast, for \$9.00. We packed enough food left over to eat for two more suppers!

At the latitudes we are in now, it stays daylight until 10 or 10:30. The sunrise is also early, 4: 30 or so.

We drive through miles and miles of cedar forest, we do not see any humans for hours, except those in oncoming motorhomes. We will arrive at the Pioneer RV Park in Whitehorse, YT. Here they have a good area for changing oil. Large ramps to drive up on, oil pans, creepers to get under the coach, and oil disposal facilities.
